A MESSAGE FROM THE BUSINESS MANAGER WORK PICTURE

Calls are still going unfilled in Oregon for the data centers, so if you have an Oregon license, these contractors could use the help. We have started to see the Owner/General give out some piece meal work to our non-union counterparts. This work has helped our local for many years, and I hope that we can supply the manpower to keep it. They continue to build more data centers and we don't see the end in sight. CREM and Phase 2 each have work at the Lamb Weston in Richland. Contractors are still bidding portions of work as the general contractor has decided to break up the job into many pieces. Weather has affected their manpower needs up to this point. Williams Plant Services is hiring every couple of weeks with the bulk of hiring close to March. The VIT plant has held steady through the holidays, and I'm sure they will be increasing manpower at some point, as they will be trying to reach deadlines in late 2017 and 2018. It was also announced that Bechtel National and AECOM have started a joint venture called WTCC LLC(Waste Treatment Construction Company). This will lead to construction, startup, and operations all being under the same umbrella. This has raised many questions and the local Building Trades Council continues to sort out all the details. There are 51 on Book I and 42 on Book II.

Organizing Report

How Can You Help?

In recent weeks, I have been asked various questions pertaining to organizing and the role members of a local have in the process. That role is purely dictated by the individual. We have members who volunteer their time to participate in committees and blitzes; likewise, we have members who don't wish to participate. Some of the members I have spoken to want to be involved in organizing, but don't know how to become actively involved. The following are a few ways that you as members can become involved in the organizing culture of your Local Union.

Participate in Your Membership Development Committee

LU 112's MDC regularly meets on the last Wednesday of the month, 7pm at the hall. The topics of our meetings can range from discussing the latest market share study that was performed (CDR reports), to developing the agenda for the New Member Orientation and planning the next community event LU 112 will participate in. It is an open forum that works best when we have multiple/various points of view.

Attend a COMET Class Recently we have focused our COMET training on our apprenticeship classes. Realizing that the information contained in a COMET class is critical to the future of the IBEW, we will begin offering COMET classes throughout the year to all members. The next class will be held February 18th, 8am at the hall. At this class, we will discuss the founding of the IBEW; what made us strong, the weakening of the IBEW, what went wrong, what we have learned and how we need to prepare ourselves as we move forward.

Reach Out to the Unrepresented Workers Many of our members, either through work or personal relationships, know individuals who work for open shops. If possible, have a conversation with them and let them know what we are about. Remind them that we get up in the morning and go to work (just like they do), want to make a livable wage to support our family (just like they want) and return to our family safe at the end of the day (just like they should). If you are uncomfortable having this conversation, refer them to the hall or apprenticeship. It could be as simple of calling and providing the name of someone who you have spoken to, and then let the hall follow up.

Inform the Hall Of what? Everything, everyone. Our members are the eyes and ears of their Local. If you are working on a job and suddenly Pilot Electric shows up and is performing work, call and let us know. We will research them and follow up with them. If you go shopping at the mall and notice XYZ doing tenant improvements, call and let us know. We can follow up with a job site visit to speak with their employees, in time making sure that both the contractor and individuals are licensed to perform electrical work. Take pictures of work vans parked at projects and send them to the hall. Everything helps. Small things, that can have large impacts. SUPPLEMENTAL BENEFIT ACCOUNT vs MEDICARE

Are you looking to retire under Medicare in the near future and are no longer covered under the H & W Plan, but still have a substantial balance in your Health & Welfare SBA? The Supplement Benefit Account (SBA) is considered an insurance plan, so when you go under Medicare, the SBA is considered your primary insurance! If considered your primary insurance to pay claims, rather than reimburse you for expenses not covered, your account will be depleted quickly. So instead of reimbursing you for non-covered expenses, you will be paying your claims from your SBA., before Medicare. That being said, if you fall into this category, be sure to submit your claims to the SBA for reimbursement, before you run out of coverage. You can go back as far when the SBA started, as long as you were eligible under the Health & Welfare Plan.

If you retire a few years before going under Medicare, you can use the SBA to make self payments under the Plan, which would gradually reduce your account balance before attaining Medicare age. If you have questions, don't hesitate to contact the hall.

OSHA'S NEW FINAL RULE FOR OCCCUPATIONAL EXPOSURE TO BERYLLIUM

OSHA has finalized a rule with new beryllium standards for general industry, construction, and shipyards. The new rule is available for public inspection and was published in the Federal Register on Monday, January 9th. Beryllium is a highly toxic metal and workers who inhale beryllium are at an increased risk of developing chronic beryllium disease (CBD), or lung cancer.

The final rule replaces a 40-year old permissible exposure limit (PEL) for beryllium, establishes a new short term exposure limit, requires employers to use engineering and work practice controls and includes a medical surveillance program.

Approximately 62,000 workers were exposed to beryllium in the aerospace, electronics, energy, telecommunications, medical and defense industries. OSHA estimates that each year the final rule will save the lives of 94 workers and prevent 46 new cases of chronic beryllium disease.

The final rules take effect on March 10, 2017. All sectors have one year to comply with most of the requirements, two years to provide any required change rooms and showers, and three years to implement engineering controls.
